### MEETING SUMMARY

#### 1. Welcome and Introductions

- Patrick Holland mentioned that he will be taking over as the lead for this Subcommittee and that Coby Skye will continue to oversee all the Roadmap efforts
- Attendees were welcomed and participants introduced themselves

#### 2. Recap Previous Meeting

- The draft outline of the overall Organic Management Plan which includes all three focus areas was presented along with a list of options to efficiently collect organic waste
- An update was provided on the number of businesses visited that are large generators of organics
- A discussion was held on the need to find more local markets for compost as well as the lack of facilities to process organic waste

#### 3. Organics

Christopher Sheppard and Clark Ajwani, Public Works, presentation (starts on slide <u>#25</u>)

- Assembly Bill 1826 Compliance
  - An Unincorporated Organics Management Plan must be in place by December 31, 2015
  - The law goes into effect in April 2016 for the first tier of businesses (those who generate 8 cubic yards or more per week) to arrange for organic waste recycling services
    - Potentially 1,300 businesses in the first tier; visited half of them to date, and the remainder will be visited by the end of October

• Most people are recycling because of AB 341, but most are not recycling organics

**Discussion** 

- Is there an Organics Ordinance?
  - No ordinance at this time but that is an option for the future
- Strip mall bins are shared; is the organic waste generated measured by business or by bin?
  - Currently, the only available information is service level by account, which is typically the property owner of the entire strip mall. This is a known issue that we will work to resolve.
- Waste Not LA
  - $\circ\,$  Food donation is source reduction, the top tier of the waste management paradigm
  - o Dr. Handler from Waste Not OC presented at the June Working Group meeting
  - Discussions with Public Health are under way to determine what the LA County program should look like and who should be involved based on the OC model
    - Include clinical screenings, business outreach, waste component outreach
  - When restaurants realize how much they are donating, they tend to cut back on the food they buy and become more efficient; therefore you constantly have to find new businesses to donate food.

### <u>Discussion</u>

- $\circ$   $\;$  Need to identify farms that want to take ripe fruits and veggies  $\;$
- Do non-profit food banks have to get Board approval to received donated food?
  - Who monitors enforcement? Public Health will likely be involved
- Food purchasing section of the Internal Services Department should be involved
- Food donators should be recognized in some way
  - Similar to letter grade from the Health Department
- Pilot Collection Program with County Sanitation Districts (CSD)
  - Partnering with CSD and negotiating with Republic on pilot food waste collection program in 2 Garbage Disposal Districts (Firestone and Belvedere)
  - Tentative start date for this program is September 21, 2015
  - Food waste will be taken to Puente Hills MRF for separation, then to Waste Management's OC facility to create slurry, finally to Sanitation District's Carson facility to co-digest

### 4. County Unincorporated Communities Annual Report to CalRecycle

Nilda Gemeniano, Public Works, presentation

- Provided statistics of tonnage generated, disposed, and recycled to meet mandatory recycling requirement of 50%
- Described the numerous programs and efforts to meet and exceed recycling requirements
  - Franchises, outreach, composting learning centers, school gardens, Household Hazardous Waste drop off centers, libraries and mobile events
  - $\circ$  Over 50 schools signed up for the Smart Gardening Program in 2015
- The 50% disposal target for LA County is 7.4 pounds per person per day (pppd) and we are currently at 4 pppd (roughly a 73% diversion rate)

### 5. Pharmaceuticals Extended Producer Responsibility

Gabriel Arenas, Public Works, presentation (starts on slide <u>#29</u>)

- On June 2, 2015, the Board adopted a motion to investigate options for reducing improper use and disposal of unwanted pharmaceuticals and to support a take back program
- On August 11, 2015 the Board approved a motion to initiate stakeholder engagement with the pharmaceutical industry and other stakeholders and to draft an ordinance by February 2016
- Study shows that people prefer dropping off unwanted drugs at pharmacies instead of Sheriff's stations

<u>Discussion</u>

- How is the existing program being promoted?
  - Through CleanLA.com and word of mouth; however, we do not want to overly promote the current unsustainable program

### 6. Open Discussion and Next Steps

- Sustainability Council Leadership Committee is made up of seven departments: Internal Services, Public Works, Public Health, Regional Planning, Community Development Commission, Parks and Recreation, and Sheriff
  - $\circ$  Second level is the coordination committee which has over 10 departments
  - Third level is working group level: water, framework, and cap and trade program with possibly adding additional subcommittees for waste and extended producer responsibility
- They will be apprised of the Roadmap's progress at their meeting on Thursday, September 3, 2015.
- 2 current tasks finalize framework and develop plan with schedule with numerical goals and metrics; plan due to the Board in December 2015
