**ASSEMBLY BILL 87 (INTRODUCED JANUARY 05, 2009)  
SINGLE-USE CARRYOUT BAGS: ENVIRONMENTAL EFFECTS: MITIGATION**

The Los Angeles County Solid Waste Management Committee/Integrated Waste Management Task Force (Task Force) would like to express its **support** for Assembly Bill 87 (AB 87), which would prohibit, on and after July 1, 2010, certain stores from providing a single-use carryout bag to a customer unless the store charges a \$0.25 per-bag fee at the point of sale.

Pursuant to Chapter 3.67 of the Los Angeles County Code and the California Integrated Waste Management Act of 1989 (AB 939, as amended), the Task Force is responsible for coordinating the development of all major solid waste planning documents prepared for the County of Los Angeles and its 88 cities in Los Angeles County with a combined population in excess of 10 million. Consistent with these responsibilities, and to ensure a coordinated and cost-effective and environmentally-sound solid waste management system in Los Angeles County, the Task Force also addresses issues impacting the system on a Countywide basis. The Task Force membership includes representatives of the League of California Cities-Los Angeles County Division, the County of Los Angeles Board of Supervisors, the City of Los Angeles, the waste management industry, environmental groups, the public, and a number of other governmental agencies.

Each year, approximately 19 billion plastic carryout bags are consumed in California, the equivalent of 1,600 bags per household per year. Less than 5 percent of those bags are recycled, with the remainder disposed in landfills or ending up littered on our beaches, waterways, parks and roads. Plastic bag litter makes up as much as 25 percent of the litter stream and significantly impacts our communities and the environment. In Los Angeles County alone, local and state governments spend tens of millions of dollars each year on litter prevention, stormwater infrastructure, cleanup, and enforcement activities, addressing single use bag litter. Communities throughout California are grappling with this issue and are searching for ways to reduce the impact

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that littered bags have on their quality of life. If enacted, AB 87 would help to positively address this issue while building upon on the framework established by AB 2449 (2006 statutes).

The Task Force supports efforts that increases plastic bag recycling and reduces the use of single use carryout bags. The establishment of per bag fees is a highly effective approach to reducing plastic bag usage and litter; therefore this bill would go a long way towards reducing the number of bags entering our environment. AB 87 would provide local governments the progressive tools they need in order to successfully address this issue.
