I. CALL TO ORDER

Meeting called to order at 1:04 p.m. by Mr. Sam Shammas.

II. APPROVAL OF THE JANUARY 19, 2023 MINUTES

Ms. Margaret Clark made a motion to approve the minutes, as revised, and Mr. Mike Mohajer seconded. Motion passed with four abstentions.

III. REPORT FROM THE PUBLIC EDUCATION AND INFORMATION SUBCOMMITTEE (PEIS)

Mr. Mohajer reported the following at the PEIS meeting:

The Subcommittee reviewed seven articles to be published in the spring issue of the Inside Solid Waste Newsletter. Articles included Feeding Student Mind and Body with a Vegetable Garden on Campus, Explore Creative Possibilities in Your Garden, Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors Adopts Zero Waste Plan, Impacts of Recent Legislation on Conversion Technologies, and three additional articles from the City's of Hawthorne, Malibu, and Burbank. The Subcommittee also requested staff to write an article on the status of conversion technology proposed by H Cycle, which uses hydrogen, and CalRecycle not considering it landfill reduction, but rather a disposal facility.

IV. REPORT FROM THE ALTERNATIVE TECHNOLOGY ADVISORY SUBCOMMITTEE (ATAS)

Mr. Fahim Rahimi reported the following at the ATAS meeting:

- GHD provided a <u>presentation</u> on creating hydrogen directly from anaerobic digestion without the intermediate step of creating biogas.
- Tetra Tech continued expanded evaluation of potential sites for organic waste processing or thermal conversion facilities and other potential sites in the County. They are also supporting Public Works with preparation of a grant application for CalRecycle Organics Grant Program, Cycle 7 for development of anaerobic digestion facility at the Calabasas Landfill.
- Staff provided an update on upcoming conversion technology events and conferences that may also be found in the <u>Conversion Technology Newsletter</u>.

V. REPORT FROM THE FACILITY AND PLAN REVIEW SUBCOMMITTEE (FPRS)

Ms. Betsey Landis reported the following at the FPRS meeting:

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- Sunshine Canyon Landfill (SCL) Odor Complaints from South Coast Air Quality Management District (AQMD): There were 226 odor complaints for the month of January 2023. As of February 7, 2023, there were 6 Notice of Violations issued by AQMD.
- The Subcommittee passed a motion to recommend that the Task Force send letters to various agencies relating to SCL including Health Risk Assessment Study conducted by SCL-Community Advisory Committee's consultant, Odor Mitigation Measures, and the Joint Technical Document.

Before voting on the recommended motion by the FPRS, Mr. Jordan Sisson expressed his understanding that the Subcommittee received a staff report with detailed discussion and suggested having a presentation for the Task Force at next month's meeting to consider the matter being voted upon. Mr. Mohajer responded that due to mandated State deadlines, that any future action by the Task Force would become irrelevant. Mr. Mohajer recommended that Mr. Sisson consider participating in the FPRS to acquire the information he needs. Ms. Emiko Thompson requested some additional discussion to understand what the recommended motion was as she did not attend the FPRS meeting. Mr. Mohajer explained the motion in greater detail.

Mr. Sisson asked for clarification regarding a motion being called upon for action that is not explicitly listed in the agenda and asked if the formal action is permissible under the Brown Act. Mr. Mohajer explained that the issue was raised many years ago and the specific language from County Counsel was noted on the agenda as "may take action on recommendations from Subcommittee." Ms. Landis also commented that it was the FPRS' responsibility to review many documents from various agencies and that the Subcommittee does the basic footwork to keep the Task Force apprised. Discussion ensued.

Mr. Mohajer made a motion for the Task Force to send a letter, and Ms. Landis seconded. Motion passed with six voting yes and five abstaining.

VI. LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Mr. Charles Darensbourg provided the following update:

- The last day to introduce bills in both Houses will be on February 17, 2023. Bills introduced this year, will have two years to make it through the legislative process. Currently there are over 1,500 bills introduced by both legislative branches.
- On January 18, 2023, CalRecycle held their SB 1383 (Lara, 2016) chat webinar and focused on the implementation of SB 1383 in multi-family dwellings.

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- CalRecycle provided an update on SB 619 (Laird, 2021), the corrective action plan compliance. As of January 18, 2023, CalRecycle finalized 23 correction action plans and sent them to respective jurisdictions. All correction plans will be available on CalRecycle's website.
- CalRecycle announced they would provide \$81 million through the Organic Grant Program for local governments, private profit companies, and State agencies for composting and anerobic digestion facilities. Applications are due April 20, 2023.
- On January 31, 2023, CalRecycle hosted their kickoff SB 54 (Allen, 2022) informational workshop webinar. Meetings will be held monthly. The next workshop is scheduled for February 20, 2023.

There were 30 bills on the <u>Legislative Table</u> and one bill on the cover page for consideration:

Mr. Mohajer made a motion to support in concept SB 244 (Eggman, 2023) "Right to Repair Act", and Mr. Sisson seconded. Motion passed with one abstention.

Ms. Landis was pleased to see many bills being introduced that are considering the handling of various fuels to power vehicles and numerous devices.

VII. CALRECYCLE UPDATE

Mr. Joseph Rasmussen provided an <u>update</u> from CalRecycle.

Mr. Mohajer commented that he read in the publication, Waste News, that the Director of CalRecycle indicated that the disposal in 2021 had increased by one million tons. Therefore, not meeting the 50 percent reduction of organics based on SB 1383, and he emphasized the need of facilities to handle the organic waste to be diverted from landfill disposal. Mr. Mohajer commented that H Cycle technology was a hydrogen process that used organic waste and is more effective than composting technology and that CalRecycle staff endorsed the technology. Mr. Mohajer requested that CalRecycle send the Task Force a letter or have guidelines distributed to vendors that could develop the technology. Ms. Margaret Clark concurred with Mr. Mohajer stating that the Task Force had been promoting CTs for decades and did not understand why CalRecycle did not want to look at every possibility available to reduce gas emissions. Mr. Rasmussen responded that it was a very difficult issue and that he would forward comments to CalRecycle's management team.
