District No. 29 — Phased Water Conservation Lifted All Districts — New Water Budget

The Board of Supervisors lifted the Phased Water Conservation Plan on March 15, 2011. Thanks to your conservation efforts, Waterworks District No. 29 met the Statewide requirement to conserve and reduce water use by 15 percent. Although the water crisis is over, we still need to comply with the State law (Senate Bill SBX7-7) to reduce water use by 20 percent by 2020.

In order to comply with this State law, we anticipate introducing a water budget-based rate structure in early 2012 for all Districts. Starting this summer and fall, your bi-monthly water bills will include your bimonthly water budget to help you understand and prepare for the new rate structure. Water budgets for each customer are determined following State guidelines that include number of full-time occupants, irrigated landscape area, climate conditions, and/or historical use.

The bi-monthly water budget shown on your bill enables you to compare your actual usage to your water budget. If you use more than your budget. please visit www.lacwaterworks.org for tips on using water more efficiently or call (626) 300-3398 to speak with a water conservation specialist to help you meet your water budget.



SUMMER WATER TIPS

Long, hot days are here, and while your plants need more water, you could inadvertently water them too much. Excess water that drains from your property either flows to the ocean carrying with it pesticides used in gardening, trash, oil drippings, dirt, and more or leaves unattractive ponds in your neighborhood that can damage roads and cause costly repairs. These simple steps can help you reduce the amount of water leaving your property:

Water only in the early morning or after dusk. Watering during the hottest time of the day causes water to evaporate quickly and means longer watering cycles.

Follow a recommended watering schedule using the water calculator. Over watering causes runoff.

Check your irrigation system and outdoor watering needs. Check your irrigation system and sprinkler heads regularly for leaks and repair them immediately.

Use drip irrigation along planters, gardens, and trees. Drip irrigation systems can help reduce your use by 30-65 percent compared to traditional sprinkler systems which use 15-20 gallons of water per minute.

Consider a Water Efficient Landscape — Use native and drought tolerant plants appropriate for your local climate conditions. Maintaining a landscape that is entirely lawn turf requires a lot more water and is therefore significantly more expensive.
